'February Fill Dyke'

"February Fill Dyke": this is how the locals in the flat-lying village where I grew up in rural Lincolnshire used to refer to this month - when all the ditches were swollen with rain. It's part of a traditional *poem which characterises each month of the year according to its typical Weather.

This year bears out this ancient wisdom - though round here, January also qualified fairly spectacularly for the same title! We've had record levels of rainfall during weeks of relentless cold winds and rain. Our meadows have been flooded, and the fields are criss-crossed by the patterns of ancient ditches and other earthworks thrown into relief by channels of water.

In the Christian calendar, February is a busy month, beginning with the Feast of Candlemas on 2nd February. This ancient celebration traditionally marks the first visit of Christ to the temple. Candles were lit throughout, in Churches and homes. Nowadays in France the custom is to celebrate Candlemas 'La Chandeleur' with all the family together, eating a copious number of crêpes! By tradition here in northern France, the first crêpe of the batch is always carefully set aside on a plate and then mounted atop the kitchen cupboard, where it remains for the forthcoming year. Its golden round shape symbolising the warmth of the sun and is believed to bring good luck to the family for the whole year until the next 2nd February. This leads us conveniently to our own Pancake Day, Shrove Tuesday, which this year falls on 21st February. The following day, Ash Wednesday of course marks the start of Lent; a date worked out by counting back via the complicated formula by which the date of Easter (9th April this year) is calculated.

It is this time when we begin to wonder when winter will ever end. But then, just as it feels as if it might never stop, nature throws in all sorts of signs of hope and rebirth in February: a frosty walk through the garden reveals snowdrops and winter aconites struggling to come through; sticky buds on the horse chestnuts; bunches of catkins on hornbeam and hazel ...

The heartening promise of spring not-too-faraway, faithfully following the unique and timeless rhythm of the seasons. **MS**

We continue to feel the impact of Brexit – particularly its effect on mobility and residence/visa requirements; some communities are still recovering and rebuilding post-Covid, and all of us feel the prevailing sharp cost of living increases.

We re-iterate our gratitude and thanks to all our ordained and lay leaders who continue to sustain chaplaincy life in these difficult times.

Safeguarding updates

The Safeguarding team has seen some significant change recently. Andy Munro, formerly with London Diocese and with a police background, is now our Assistant Head of Safeguarding, working alongside Grace Fagan-Stewart. Meanwhile, Craig Norman is now working full-time with us on Safeguarding Administration, with a particular focus on the administration of safeguarding training.

The replacement for Laura O'Brien looking after compliance and checks will arrive later this month. Safeguarding children and vulnerable adults remains a crucial element of our mission...

Safeguarding updates

The members of the Chaplaincy Conseil are updating their safeguarding compliances, which is a bit more complicated than before. Some members on the chaplaincy council are second home owners in France, therefore are now required to apply for a Casier Judiciere, as they are a representative of a chaplaincy in the Diocese in Europe.

It is very important to be compliant when we are trying to recruit a priest to our area.

The Chaplaincy are still trying to recruit a deputy safeguarding officer, so if you wish to support the safeguarding officer in this important role, making sure we are compliant and working together to ensure those vulnerable are safeguarded. *Please see details below If you wish to apply...*We should be aware that safeguarding is everyone's concern and everyone is encouraged to do the on-line courses. *Daphne Power*

Special Recruitment

The Chaplaincy requires a Deputy Safeguarding Officer to support the Safeguarding Officer (*Daphne Power*) in her role.

Deputy Safeguarding Officer is an important role in working to ensure that the chaplaincy is a safer place in which to worship and to socialise.

This post is open to applicants from all three churches.

If you are interested in this important and worthy role, with an awareness of the safety of those attending our churches, and a wish to support the Chaplaincy in this work, further information, in the form of a Job Description, Personal Specification and Code of Conduct, can be obtained from Daphne by email at safeguardingPDC@hotmail.com

All applicants should hold, or be willing to undertake an enhanced DBS (*Disclosure and Barring Service*) and complete safeguarding training to the highest level required for the post.

Most of the training can be done virtually online, with a specific 'Leaders Course' spread over two half-days.

The applicant is required to provide two, character references, (not by a relative or friend). In the absence of a Chaplain: appointments will be made by the Safeguarding Officer and the Chaplaincy President; once they have received the references. Daphne Power
