Another Olympic-Sized Challenge

In August this year, the sporting world's attention has been focused on Paris and on the triumph of the 2024 Olympics, the success of which has been a source of genuine pride for France. Then, to complete the cycle, its parallel spectacle, the remarkable Paralympics began on 28th August.



But that date also marked a rather lesser known – but equally keenly contested – international event, even closer to home:

The World Chip Frying Competition!

This festival takes place each year in the Grand'Place in Arras. It is truly an international event, with teams from France, Belgium, Germany, Thailand, Japan, England and Canada. And, make no mistake, it is taken extremely seriously. The rewards and accolades for the eventual winner are enormous: last year it was Aurèle Mestré from Arras; sales from his local chip shop have soared and he is now to open a chain of similar *friteries*.

World Chip Frying Championships: Arras

This venue in northern France was chosen because most historians credit the creation of the humble chip to France or Belgium. Of course, there is a vigorous continuing dispute over which of the two actually invented them - the Belgians objecting strongly to the term "French fries".

Many believe that the first chips were prepared in the late 17th and early 18th centuries, in what is now Belgium. Legend has it that the poor villagers of the Meuse area lived on a diet of tiny local river fish, which they fried. When the rivers froze, ruling out fishing, fried slivers of potato became a substitute. Other historians dispute this, arguing that the potato did not arrive in this region until the mid-18th century. One argued that, given economic conditions at the time, "it is unthinkable that a peasant could have dedicated large quantities of fat for cooking potatoes".



Other theories abound. According to the curator of the Belgian Chip Museum (yes, there actually is one, in Bruges!) they may have originated in Spain, which introduced the potato to Europe from the New World. Saint Teresa of Avila, a 17th century Carmelite nun in Seville, cultivated the newly-discovered potato in the cloister garden. She cut small figures of Christ from potatoes and fried them in oil. Sometimes these figures fell apart into small chip shaped strips of an arm or leg! *Hmm ...*

Arras - For the Perfect Chip?

As early as 1802, US President Thomas Jefferson requested for a White House dinner "potatoes prepared in the French manner"; and by the mid-1800s, the term "French fried potatoes" was appearing in print. In terms of sheer consumption, of course, the US dominates. It is the world's largest consumer of chips/French fries, with McDonald's serving a staggering 4,000 tonnes per day!

So today this unpretentious side-dish has risen from that humble early serving suggestion to international culinary icon. And no matter whether invented in Belgian, France, Spain, or the US — what could be better than sitting in a beachside café on the Côte d'Opale at this time of year with a cool beer and a generous serving of *moules frites! I woke up in the night. I live about a mile from the sea in a second -floor apartment. When I open my window, I can see out over the rooftops and trees.





The God Story


Encountering Unfailing Love in the Unfolding Narrative of Scripture


The LORD replied:


