The Algae of Audresselles



As we all know, we are very fortunate to have so many interesting local and natural history associations in our region; on top of all the cultural and artistic events that go on throughout the year.

Recently, I stumbled on one such program in the Côte d'Opale. A nature walk, entitled 'Découverte et saveurs des algues à Audresselles. An opportunity to learn about the fascinating world of edible seaweeds on a field trip to Audresselles; a pretty, small resort, near Cap Gris Nez.

This was an event that formed part of the annual Festival de l'Oiseau et de la Nature which organises a range of events in the Baie de la Somme and along the Côte d'Opale, run by an enthusiastic group of dedicated local volunteers.

Our expert guide was renowned local herbalist, Hubert Lévèque, who led our intrepid group across the rocky shore and patiently explained the extraordinary richness of this under-utilised, but potentially hugely important source of nutrition. I confess I knew nothing about seaweed, apart from enjoying as a child popping the bubbles on slippery bladder wrack; and more recently enjoying Japanese sushi wrapped in nori seaweed. As we stumbled and splashed across the rock pools, we learned that most of the seaweed we commonly see is edible; and that the few non-edible varieties are easily recognised. We were invited to nibble one species after another. And what an

extraordinary variety of flavours these raw algae provided!

Starting at the top in this photo, we have here Toothed Wrack (delicious nutty flavour); Carrageen Moss (widely used in food manufacture as a gelling agent; with a citrusy flavour); Dulse (tangy, smoky); Sea Lettuce (like cucumber); Mermaid's Hair (salady); and Gutweed (smell of shrimps). Each one of these is packed full of protein, vitamins and essential trace elements. I was astonished to learn that some varieties contain more protein than steak; more calcium than dairy products – and up to four times as much Vitamin C as oranges!

At the end of the tour, on the beach, we were treated to a splendid alfresco lunch made up of all the varieties we'd been collecting; including a cocktail, various spreads, salads and delicious crunchy dried products. Incidentally, Hubert organises a number of these beach trips through the summer.

Apart from collecting them from the beaches - and there is a strict code of practice to restrict the seasons and to avoid over-harvesting - I gather they are available as dried products from health food shops and the major supermarkets.
