Crécy and The Prince of Wales



We are surrounded by so much history here in northern France. Over the centuries, the French, the English, the Dutch and the Spanish have all vied for possession of this region.

The best-known local reminder of these conflicts is of course at Agincourt, *Azincourt* to the French, where a major battle against the French was fought in 1415, and now with a major visitor centre, museum, local restaurant, and busy programme of re-enactment events.

This was a key battle in the 100 years' war; but arguably more important strategically and historically was the Battle of Crécy, which took place in 1346 on 26th August - the day on which I am writing this!

Briefly, the 100 years' war was the culmination of the dynastic rumblings since the Norman Conquest between England and France. In the 14thC, tensions between the English and French thrones and disputes over ownership of French possessions erupted into a series of battles in a conflict that lasted over a century.

In 1346, the English king Edward III sought to renew his claim to the French throne by force of arms. His forces landed in Normandy and eventually headed north hoping to link up with an allied Flemish army. On learning they had turned back, Edward had his army prepare a defensive position on a hillside at *Crécy-en-Ponthieu*, just north of the Somme. On 26th August, the French army; which greatly outnumbered the English, attacked.

As at Agincourt 70 years later, the French crossbow proved no match for the English longbow, and a decisive victory was won at Crécy. French losses were catastrophic, the slain included a King, John of Bohemia. On seeing the fallen King, Edward's son, the Black Prince (whom he had created Prince of Wales) allegedly plucked the ostrich feathers from the King's helmet and adopted them as his arms. The three feathers are to this day the symbol of the Prince of Wales.

At Crécy today, there is a small local museum and an observation tower overlooking the battlefield; which remains virtually as it was seven centuries ago. So, well worth a visit!
