### Hazel Grant Crompton (née Smith) 14/02/1945 – 26/09/2025



Last month we said a sad farewell to Hazel Crompton, a very dear friend and active member of the Chaplaincy. Hazel went to be with the Lord after her long and courageously fought illness. Her funeral service was led by Fr. Simon Walker on 2<sup>nd</sup> Oct in Abbeville crematorium. Hazel's family requested 'no flowers'- however, 200 euros in donations were given to the Alzheimer's Society.

Our thoughts and prayers go out to her devoted husband Jim who cared for her at home up until her last few days.



Jim and Hazel were married on the 13/061992.

Hazel and Jim moved to France in 2002. They attended church in ogne and later Arras. It soon became evident to Hazel that with the growing number of Eng

It soon became evident to Hazel that with the growing number of Englishspeaking people living in and around the Hesdin area, that there was a great need for a church closer to home; and once Hazel got an idea in her head, she was determined to make it happen. So, she set about starting a branch of the Anglican Church in Hesdin. Her determination paid off, and in 2003 the Hesdin worship centre was born. But it wasn't all smooth sailing, as she still had to convince others; she persuaded the Rev Roy Kilford to come on board, but she still needed permission from other sources. She approached the Mairie in Hesdin, who were very keen to help, then she convinced Abbe Noel of Hesdin Catholic Church to have the first joint service there, this was attended by approximately seventy people. The next step for Hazel was to find a residence where the Anglican church could meet regularly and not clash with the catholic services in Hesdin. Hazel soon achieved her goal and secured the use of the large church on the hill in Huby -Saint-Leu. After many years of worship there, Hazel realised the congregation could no longer bear the cold or continue without facilities. Therefore, she went on another mission to secure more suitable premises, and she once again persuaded Abbe Noel to loan us the use of the Church Halls in Hesdin, where we now worship. Hazel served the church in Hesdin for twelve years as Church Warden until her illness prevented her from doing so. She served with great commitment, dedication and generosity. The hymn books we use in the church were donated by Hazel and Jim.

Some may only know Hazel as being an important asset to our Chaplaincy, but she had many talents and commitments elsewhere. She spoke fluent Italian and loved to visit Florence regularly, where she worked as a young woman.



She was deeply committed to the GFS (Girls Friendly Society) and especially worked with teenage mothers. She encouraged them to continue their schooling and was involved in finding them accommodation etc.

Hazel was chief executive of the GFS from 1986 to 2003: she became Chair of Trustees in 2009; became their UK President in 2013, and held this post for three years. This was a great honour for Hazel which was well merited. Because of her work, she and Jim were invited to Buckingham Palace for one of their garden parties. Hazel was very humble about her many achievements: she

earned a Diploma in Theology from the University of Kent at Canterbury in 1993, and in 2000 she completed a Diploma from the Royal Institute of Chartered Surveyors.

Hazel was a kind, strong and determined woman who put her heart into everything.

Hazel, we will all miss you - and your bright smile!

## Bishop's Advent Appeal

## Al-Ahli Anglican Hospital, Gaza



"When the righteous cry for help, the Lord hears and rescues them from all their troubles. The Lord is near to the broken-hearted and saves the crushed in spirit." – Psalm 34:17-18 (NRSV)

The headlines may be fading, but the suffering in Gaza is far from over. Months of devastation have left entire communities struggling. The impact of conflict lingers long after the fighting stops. Disease spreads rapidly, food and clean water remain scarce. At the time of writing, 68,280 people have been killed in Gaza, the vast majority of whom are civilian women and children, and the toll of wounded stands at 170,375.



Despite overwhelming challenges, the medical team at Al-Ahli Hospital in Gaza is doing everything in their power to care for the injured and sick. They face impossible odds: shortages of medicine and essential supplies, dwindling fuel reserves for life-saving equipment, and an ever-growing number of patients in desperate need.

At Al-Ahli Hospital, doctors and nurses have treated over 190,000 outpatients and performed more than 6,000 surgeries in the past year alone. The demand is relentless. The injuries they see of burns,

broken bones and shrapnel wounds are devastating.

Beyond emergency treatment, Al-Ahli hospital offers long-term rehabilitation, mental health support, and essential community care. Many of those injured will face lifelong disabilities, requiring physiotherapy, pain management, and counselling. Without urgent funding, these critical services could be lost.

This Advent, I am asking you to support the work of one of our partners in the Gospel, USPG, whose partnership with the Diocese of Jerusalem gives us the opportunity to sustain this vital hospital, ensuring that it remains open and equipped to serve those who need it most, not only in moments of immediate crisis but in the long, difficult years of recovery that follow.

The readings and intercessions were shared by members of the Boulogne and Calais Congregations; Gillie and Gael selected and led the hymns. Joseph, gave thoughts on the Harvest readings, US Thanksgiving and life.

Z... a guest at MS House gave a witness testimony on life as a migrant living and working in Europe searching for some kind of future stability.



We sang our final Harvest hymn, then shared our Harvest Thanksgiving meal. Gifts of snacks, fruit juice and small bottles of water were presented to members of the staff at MS House towards their work.

### A Time to Remember

Poppy Day – 11th November

As detailed above, Hesdin will be holding a special event in the Parish Rooms on Remembrance Sunday (this year the 9th November) to commemorate the contribution of British and Commonwealth military and civilian servicemen and women in the two World Wars and later conflicts.

Then on the 11th November we have Remembrance Day (also known as Poppy Day), observed each year since the end of the First World War to recall the end of hostilities, which ceased "at the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month" of 1918, an occasion remembered in towns and villages throughout the UK, France and other Allied nations.

In Montreuil-sur-Mer, there will be a full programme of commemorative events, with a service in the Church of Saint-Saulve at 11:00h; and wreath laying ceremonies at intervals through the morning at the War Memorial and other key local landmarks, in the presence of Montreuil's Sous-Préfet, the Mayor and the Municipal Council, with musical accompaniment for the procession provided by the Town Band.

At 10:00h a wreath will be laid at the statue of Field Marshal Douglas Haig in the main square. This commemoration is particularly poignant because it recalls the key role played by Montreuil in achieving the final victory in WWI. For it was here that Haig established the British Army's General Headquarters. From 1916-19, Montreuil was the nerve centre of Allied operations, with the enormous task of arming, supplying, feeding and transporting millions of soldiers. At the height of the war, 5,000 allied soldiers were based in Montreuil engaged in planning, supply and communications: an incredible logistical feat. Remember that, although direct communications were vital, this was before the age of modern telecommunications – even before radio came into general use - all they had was the telephone and the telegraph.

Why Montreuil? Because Montreuil was the ideal location, with good transport links to England via the Channel ports; and rail links to Arras, which was the focus of much of the fighting in northern France. And it was safe - or so they thought: in 1917 there were many casualties in a raid by German bombers on the town

Haig has been judged harshly by some historians; but it is noteworthy that after the war Haig devoted himself tirelessly to the rehabilitation of ex-servicemen and their families. He launched the Haig Poppy Fund to raise funds for unemployed veterans and those damaged by the war; and to alleviate the suffering of a generation of war widows. He founded the Royal British Legion, which celebrated its

centenary in 2021. And his imposing statue erected in 1931 was entirely financed by a grateful French population. Destroyed by the Germans during WWII, it was reconstructed in 1951 from the artist's original mould, luckily rediscovered in a barn south of Paris!
